COUNTY SEAT: PASCO

Named for American statesman Benjamin Franklin

Traditional home of Yakama, Wanapum, Walla Walla, Cayuse, Umatilla and Nez Perce American Indian people

Franklin County is bordered by two great historic rivers: the Columbia River on the west and the Snake River on the east. The county's first outside settlers were cattle ranchers who came in the 1860s. Sheep herders and farmers soon followed. In 1879 the Northern Pacific Railway chose to complete its transcontinental line by building northwest from Pasco through the mountains to Puget Sound, paving the way for further Washington settlement and growth.

NAMED FOR AMERICAN STATESMAN BENJAMIN FRANKLIN

TRADITIONAL HOME OF YAKAMA, WANAPUM, WALLA WALLA, CAYUSE, UMATILLA AND NEZ PERCE AMERICAN INDIAN PEOPLE

FRANKLIN COUNTY IS BORDERED BY TWO GREAT HISTORIC RIVERS: THE COLUMBIA RIVER ON THE WEST AND THE SNAKE RIVER ON THE SOUTH AND EAST. THE COUNTY'S FIRST OUTSIDE SETTLERS WERE CATTLE RANCHERS WHO CAME IN THE 1860S. SHEEP HERDERS AND FARMERS SOON FOLLOWED. IN 1879 THE NORTHERN PACIFIC RAILWAY CHOSE TO COMPLETE ITS TRANSCONTINENTAL LINE BY BUILDING NORTHWEST FROM PASCO THROUGH THE MOUNTAINS TO PUGET SOUND, PAVING THE WAY FOR FURTHER WASHINGTON SETTLEMENT AND GROWTH.
