Traditional home of Hoh, Jamestown S'Klallam, Lower Elwha Klallam, Makah, Quileute and Quinault American Indian people

Clallam County is located in the farthest northwest corner of the continental United States, framed by the Strait of Juan de Fuca and the great Pacific Ocean. It is a land wild coastline, deep forest and rugged Olympic Mountains that rise up to 8,000 feet high. Because of its geographic isolation, this region is home to animal species—Olympic marmot, Crescenti trout and magnificent Roosevelt Elk—native to no other part of the world.
