DES provided an update on LCM progress to date. This update included status of the Press Corps relocation to the Legislative Building, LCM SEPA process and development of the temporary modular building project on the southeast corner of the Executive Residence parking lot to house staff displaced by work on the Newhouse, Pritchard and O'Brien buildings. Mithun provided an overview of the Pritchard Rehabilitation/Expansion Validation Study goals and schedule.

Mithun also presented concepts for two building rehabilitation options, including pros and cons for each option, slope stabilization options and historic preservation observations, as well as five concept options for building expansion. Next steps include continued development of expansion options and presentation to the Project Executive Team on Nov. 17, Capitol Campus Design Advisory Committee on Nov. 18 and State Capitol Committee on Dec. 16. The final study will be completed by March 2022.

DES asked stakeholders to provide any initial thoughts, concerns and ideas. The group discussed:

- Sustainability and the reuse of existing building materials
- Replacement options for the library stacks
- Size of the building addition and reconstruction options
- Intended use of expansion option and if it requires programmatic connection to the existing

structure

- Consideration of an above ground vs. below ground structure
- Setback requirements for construction
 - o Find Federal Facility Security Level (FSL) guidelines here
 - The LCM Predesign Report included recommendations for setbacks from vehicular access for Newhouse site in keeping with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Federal Security Level III, which was adopted by DES Capitol Security and Visitor Services (CSVS) for campus security standards
- Impact of slope stabilization on landscaping and trees; Maintaining tall tree barrier between South Capitol Neighborhood and Capitol Campus
- Integration of expansion option with existing Reading Room
- Programmatic space needs and distribution between the O'Brien, Newhouse and Pritchard buildings
- Timeline and milestones of decision-making process
- Parking considerations and needs for comprehensive LCM project
