COUNTY SEAT: SHELTON

Originally called called "Sawamish" after a local band of Squaxin Island Indians. It was renamed in 1864 in honor of Charles H. Mason, first Secretary of Washington Territory.

Traditional home of Skokomish and Squaxin Island American Indian people

Mason County, historically rich in timber and shellfish, extends from the wild Olympic Mountains to the inlets of Puget Sound. Along the edge of narrow, hook-shaped saltwater Hood Canal runs one of the most scenic shoreline drives in all of Washington.

ORIGINALLY CALLED "SAWAMISH" AFTER A LOCAL BAND OF SQUAXIN ISLAND INDIANS. IT WAS RENAMED IN 1864 IN HONOR OF CHARLES H. MASON, FIRST SECRETARY OF WASHINGTON TERRITORY

TRADITIONAL HOME OF SKOKOMISH AND SQUAXIN ISLAND AMERICAN INDIAN PEOPLE

MASON COUNTY, HISTORICALLY RICH IN TIMBER AND SHELLFISH, EXTENDS FROM THE WILD OLYMPIC MOUNTAINS TO THE INLETS OF PUGET SOUND. ALONG THE EDGE OF NARROW, HOOK-SHAPED SALTWATER HOOD CANAL RUNS ONE OF THE MOST SCENIC SHORELINE DRIVES IN ALL OF WASHINGTON.
