**COUNTY SEAT: NEWPORT** 

Name apparently derived from the vernacular French "pendant d'oreille" (earring) — a term used by French-Canadian fur traders for Native people who wore shell ornaments in their ears.

Traditional home of Kalispel American Indian people

The beautiful Pend Oreille River flows north along glacial lakebeds and through the rugged gorges of the forested Selkirk Mountains to join the Columbia River just across the Canadian border. Washington's youngest county is home to an astonishing variety of native wildlife, from bighorn sheep and mountain goat to deer, elk, mountain caribou, grizzly bear and cutthroat trout.

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D'OREILLE" (EARRING) - A TERM USED BY FRENCH-CANADIAN FUR TRADERS NAME APPARENTLY DERIVED FROM THE VERNACULAR FRENCH "PENDANT FOR NATIVE PEOPLE WHO WORE SHELL ORNAMENTS IN THEIR EARS TRADITIONAL HOME OF KALISPEL AMERICAN INDIAN PEOPLE

ASTONISHING VARIETY OF NATIVE WILDLIFE, FROM BIGHORN SHEEP AND MOUNTAIN GOAT JUST ACROSS THE CANADIAN BORDER. WASHINGTON'S YOUNGEST COUNTY IS HOME TO AN RUGGED GORGES OF THE FORESTED SELKIRK MOUNTAINS TO JOIN THE COLUMBIA RIVER THE PEND OREILLE RIVER FLOWS NORTH ALONG GLACIAL LAKEBEDS AND THROUGH THE TO DEER, ELK, MOUNTAIN CARIBOU, GRIZZLY BEAR AND CUTTHROAT TROUT.

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
