Item: Today's topic: Definition of small/diverse business

• The Office of Minority and Women's Business Enterprise (OMWBE) certifies diverse/small business and there are different city/state/federal self-reporting measures as well—this brings up problems for accurately tracking utilization. The goal of this committee is to come up with a single definition that is complementary to existing definitions—this may include going back and refining existing definitions.

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- RCW 39.26 (Procurement of Goods and Services) includes being in-state (having its principal office located in Washington State) in its definition of small business and allows businesses to certify with OMWBE or to self-report (under penalty of perjury) as an independent business and qualify based on employee number (max 50) or gross annual revenue (max \$7 million).
 - RCW 39.26 also defines microbusiness and minibusiness based on gross annual revenue.
 - RCW 39.10 (Alternative Public Works Contracting Procedures) points to RCW 39.26 to define small business.
 - RCW 39.04 (Public Works) points to microbusiness and minibusiness as defined in RCW 39.26.
- Multiple participants shared the concern that qualifying as a small business solely based on employee number leaves the door open to subcontracting out more work and having a large business with few employees.
 - However, a business's number of employees is data that is easier to capture (L&I has access to this) than a business's revenue.
- Given how large this definition is, multiple participants agreed a separate discussion is needed on how to verify small businesses qualifying under the terms in RCW 39.26.
- The issue of in-state preference/reciprocity advantage generated some discussion. The legislative intent was described as benefiting small business by benefiting the local economy—if the local economy thrives, so will small business.
- The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) defines small business according to employee number and revenue metrics, but there was concern from multiple participants that the SBA definition is too broad and does not always mean a truly small business.
 - To be considered a small business by the SBA, there is a minimum percentage of selfperformed work. This helps to address the concern of gaming the system by subcontracting out more work and having a larger business with few employees.
- Proposed: develop a definition of small business (potentially under RCW 39.04 Public Works) that
 is complementary to the definition in RCW 39.26 (Goods and Services) and work out a percentage of
 the SBA metrics that is appropriate for truly small business.
 - There was an additional suggestion to develop a registry owned by OWMBE for which you can only qualify if your revenue is capped at \$7 million, but concerns were voiced that creating another registry will raise more barriers to participation.
